Richard A. Settersten, Jr., Ph.D., is Professor of Human Development and Family Sciences and Endowed Director of the Hallie Ford Center for Healthy Children & Families in the College of Public Health and Human Sciences at Oregon State University. A graduate of Northwestern University, he held fellowships at the Max Planck Institute for Human Development and Education in Berlin, the Institute for Policy Research at Northwestern, and the Spencer Foundation in Chicago. He was a member of the MacArthur Research Network on Transitions to Adulthood, and his work has been supported by several divisions of the National Institutes of Health. Much of Dr. Settersten's research examines how entry into adult life has changed historically, how it varies across populations, and how institutions and policies affect the life pathways of young people.
